## The Share Closet Connection








## Village of Tremont

## **Did You Know?** *Tremont, in History*

Recently, the weather prediction was for a big snowstorm. So often when we get geared up for a big snow, it scurries north or south of us, leaving many disappointed. Not everyone wants the snow, but some of us do! Just a nice, several inch snow so that we can have a white Christmas, kids can make snowmen, go sledding and skating, adults have nowhere we have to be, and we can be outside or cozy up and enjoy a snowy winter's day. My love for a day like that goes back to school days, when we waited in eager anticipation, hoping for the announcement of a glorious snow day!

Many remember the heavy snows of the late 1970s or early 1980s; Snow day after snow day, snow piled higher than cars, dire predictions of a new Ice Age...now those were snowy winters! No one wants winters quite like those, though – with heavy snow to plow or shovel, rooftops heavy with snow to be cleared, loss of electricity, frozen pipes, accidents and flight cancellations. All of that was just too dangerous and inconvenient.



Looking back even further at Tremont in the “Winter of the Big Snow” in 1830-1831,...that was a world away from just inconvenient. It was about four years before Tremont was established, but a few pioneers were settled in the area. Winters were always tough for the settlers, but that winter, snow began falling on December 29 and continued to fall for three days and nights, averaging about four feet deep, but drifting as high as 20 feet deep! During that winter, it snowed 19 times from December 29 to February 13. Called “The Winter of the Big Snow,” it was a landmark for the pioneers. Events were marked as being before or after that time. People living in the area and babies born at that time were called, “Snowbirds.”

Recall that this was before our modern conveniences. The brutal wind and snow blew through cracks in the walls; people actually starved and froze for lack of food and wood. Animals in the wild starved, their bones uncovered in the spring. Somehow, there were people who did survive the terrible conditions.

So, when some of us are disappointed to miss a big snow storm, we might consider those hardy souls who were able to survive the really big snows of the winter of 1830-31!
