100 & 200 Block of W Franklin St


Monday, September 29, 2025, mill and overlay work is expected to begin on the following streets:



Tremont Curfews

Around the turn of the century, curfews for children became common. Around the 1890s, curfews were originally enacted because crime among immigrant youth was rampant, especially in larger cities. It was also a time of increased concern about social order and children's welfare.

By 1900, about 3,000 U.S. cities and towns had adopted youth curfew ordinances. This included Tremont. Various news articles from the Tremont News illustrate this:

In 1897, "The curfew law will go into effect this (Friday) evening. All good children (are) supposed to be at home in bed at 7 o'clock."

October 18, 1901, titled, "An Ordinance to Keep Children Off the Street at Night." "Be it ordained by the President (J. W. Barkdoll) and Board of Trustees of the Village of Tremont: That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any child...under the age of 16 years, within the corporate limit of the Village of Tremont to be on any street... lot, public place or business house other than his or her own after the hour of 7 o'clock p.m."

Curfew 1901

ILLINOIS, FRIDAY, OCT. 18

AN ORDINANCE

entitled an Ordinance to Keep Children
Off the Streets at Night.

Be it ordained by the President and
Board of Trustees of the Village of
Tremont;

Sec. 1, That hereafter it shall be
lawful for any child, male or female,
under the age of 16 years, within the
corporate limit of the Village of Tre-
mont, to be in or upon any street or
alley, lot, public place or business house

The article went on to state that any person violating the ordinance would be arrested and taken home and on second offense, arrested and fined.

March 21, 1913, "There'll be no 'kiddies' between the ages of 14 and 16 years roaming the streets in the future if a bill introduced (in the Illinois Senate) becomes law...the purpose of the law is to make it compulsory for children of ages specified either to go to school or work."

According to the Tremont Village Hall, today Tremont has an ordinance that states that youths younger than 18 have a curfew of midnight on weekends -Friday and Saturday, and 11 p.m. on weeknights - Sunday through Thursday.
