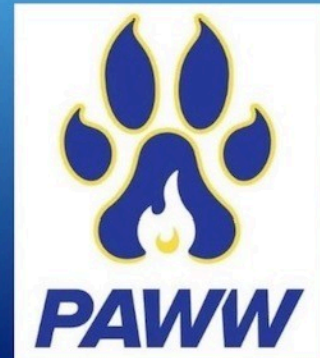

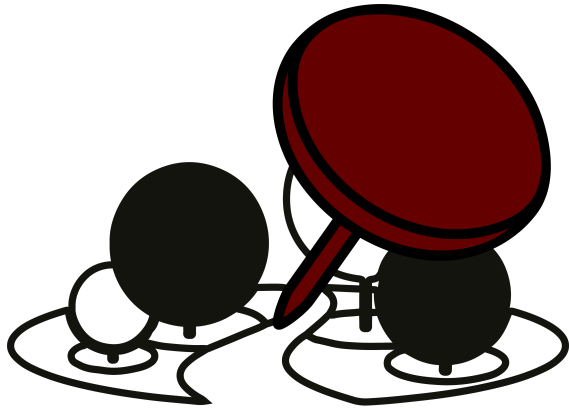

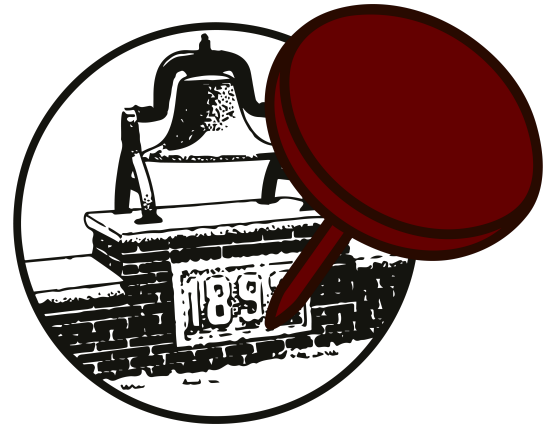

## **Did You Know?** *Tremont, in History*

**Tremont's Outstanding Female Seminary**  
*Part 2*

*It was with the best of intentions and bright hopes that a quality female seminary was established in Tremont, where it was understood from the start that education was of great importance. In last week's article, the formation and definition of the school were explained, as well as the comprehensive courses offered.*

However, it wasn't long before problems appeared.

The school faced multiple challenges: some stockholders did not pay or paid only while their own children attended, equipment was scarce, and enrollment was low. The late 1850s depression led to its closure in 1858. Although it reopened twice, recession, the approaching Civil War, and declining enrollment kept it from succeeding.

On May 20, 1861, the school's prize possession, its piano, was rented out quarterly for lessons in the school building. The board approved the loan of much of the equipment to the Tremont High School, which at that time was located in the vacated Tazewell County Courthouse on Washington Street. Later, that school evolved into the Tremont Community Unit District 702.

Interestingly, on July 5, 1862, it is recorded that the board requested of an original board member, Mr. Tompkins, to move his hogs from the seminary yard. The property and equipment sold at a public auction on May 20, 1864.

The seminary building was moved near the site of the old Bell School, which had been destroyed. The old seminary building was used for several years as a public grade school and stood on East Walnut Street, where the Baptist Church addition is today. That school was used until 1892, when a new school was built behind today's Tremont Grade School, facing South Harris Street.

The Tremont Seminary had high ideals, and though in the end could not be sustained, it set the standard for excellence in education in Tremont.

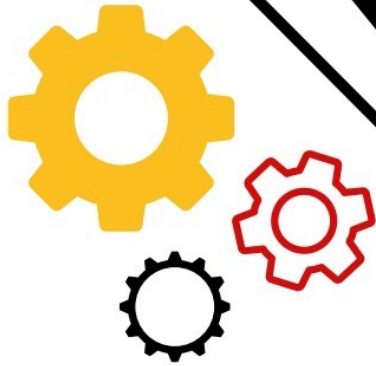

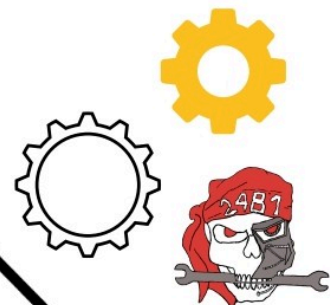
